ANECDOTES ...

A Bead Of Glue, A Sprinkle Of Glitter ...

As I awoke leisurely on this Saturday morning, I listened to some of the Saturday Morning Kid's program with the children and started my weekend chores. As I passed the calendar, panic suddenly set in. It was December 7th and in large letters I had written the "Christmas notation: Craft Seminar"!! I had been looking forward to this event!

I remembered how my own children were so proud of the crafts they brought home and how that collage of papers stuck on the refrigerator door often triggered their remembrance of a spiritual truth that they had learned from one of their lessons! After previous experiences with crafts using glue and glitter, I was persuaded that these items were best handled by kids 18 years and older!! This day, however, the Lord was going to stretch me! Still, there was that deep fear that my family leader would find me one day in the corner of my

classroom stuck in a ball of yarn, glitter, and glue!!

As I looked around the room at the various craft stations, however, I noticed that glue, glitter, and yarn was being used but everything was <u>orderly</u>. One of the craft instructors reminded us that "a bead, not a river, of glue goes a long way"! (How true!) Confining the sprinkling of the glitter to the plastic tub also made clean-up *so easy*!

As we were making the crafts, we exchanged ideas on different variations that a particular craft could take and how one could simplify it for younger children or add accents for the older ones! We also learned how to do backgrounds very quickly using a small sponge that had been wiped against a marker!

With beads, floor tiles, toilet tissue tubes, macaroni, confetti, a "bead of glue", and a "sprinkle of glitter", there were no limits to the choices of cards, angels, tree decorations, and ornaments that the children can make! I couldn't believe that crafts such

as a clothespin donkey, a bowtie macaroni angel, a tissue tube candle, and a paper plate plaque could be so elegant, yet easy to make and would be such a complement to the Bible lesson! The fellowship and the hands-on craft-making time was so much fun that the three hours flew by! I look forward to using some these crafts in our classroom and I thank the Lord for the wonderful servants who gave so much of their time and energy in blessing us with so many super examples and ideas!!

Getting To Know HIM ...

(Isaiah 9:6) The angel Gabriel tells both Mary and Joseph that they should name the Child Jesus for He would save His people of their sins. He is the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End (Revelation 1:8), Immanuel, God with us, (Matthew 1:23), the IAM (John 8:58), the Bread of Life (John 6:48), the Way, the Truth, and the Life

(John 14:6), the <u>Door of the Sheep</u> (John 10), the <u>Lamb of God</u> (Revelation 5:6), the <u>Light of the World</u> (John 8:12), <u>the Resurrection and the Life</u> (John 11:25), the <u>Good Shepherd</u> (John 10:11).

James states it very succinctly: "Draw near to God and he will draw near to you ..." (James 4:8)

not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45) Celebrate the birth of Jesus in your hearts and in your home as you read that timeless account in Scripture about Jesus' wondrous birth and ministry.





The shepherd's staff was at the first worshiping of Christ. Its counterpart is our candy cane; so old is this symbol that we have almost forgotten its origin.

We are immediately attracted to its colors: white for purity and red for sacrifice. The body of the cane is white, representing the life that is pure. The broad stripe is symbolic of our Lord's sacrifice for us. The smaller stripes represent our lives as Christians as they are intertwined with and guided by our Savior. The form of a staff suggests service: the Good Shepherd seeking to serve and even to give His own life so we might be saved.

The color and form give way to the aroma of peppermint, akin to the aromatic herb hyssop, and it pungent taste. Old Testament scholars say that hyssop was used not only for its delightful taste, but also for medicinal purposes so that a healing quality is suggested. This reminds us of the healing ministry of our Lord not only while He was on this earth but today as well.

At Christmas we celebrate the birth of the Christ child but we must also be mindful of the man, Jesus, who has had the greatest impact of anyone in the history of the world! Christmas always brings back us to the cross at Calvary. As Jesus' body was broken at Calvary to show His supreme love, we are commanded to share that love to the world. The candy cane is a candy to be shared -- broken into pieces for all, drawing us deeper into His fellowship of love and sharing.

May the Christ of Christmas live in our hearts today and all year long!!
